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What is Linkages?

Linkages is an approach to social service work that promotes collaboration between CalWORKS and Child Welfare Services when serving a mutual family.

 Goal: To improve outcomes for children and families by providing needed services and supports through collaboration



Why is Linkages Important?

Research has found that factors such as parental stress

from economic hardship can detrimentally affect parenting behaviors and result in neglect and abuse.

Studies have shown that:

- Parental stressors were significant predictors of child welfare involvement
- Increased poverty rates correspond to a rise in child maltreatment rates

Linkages

CalWORKS

CalWORKS can serve as a child abuse and neglect prevention program by providing services that support family stabilization.

Child Welfare

Child Welfare can serve as an anti-poverty program by supporting self sufficiency strategies.

Statewide CWS & TANF Match Data

Timeframe Referral Allegations Between 2009-2010	
All TANF Children	1,785,978
TANF – CWS Match	250,132 = 14%
All CWS (referral) unduplicated children	690,593
CWS – TANF Match	250,139 = 36%
All CWS (cases) Associated with a Referral	126,270
CWS TANF Match	59,921 = 47%


Effective

 - Other Concrete Services

Data Systems That Do Not Support Cross-Systems Work are Barriers


- Mutual identification of clients can be time consuming
