

## **RE:** Services to Child Victims of Commercial Sexual Exploitation

Dear Chair Weber and Members:

Our broad coalition of agencies and organizations urges your support to provide \$20.3 million General Funds in fiscal year 2014-15 to protect and serve child victims of commercial sexual exploitation through California's child welfare services programs. This funding is needed to enable California's child protection services system to develop capacity for serving this unique population who have suffered extensive abuse and trauma.

Commercial sexual exploitation of children (CSEC) is an emerging national and statewide epidemic that deserves our highest attention. Various studies have pointed to the fact that many CSEC victims have had prior involvement with CWS, and some have been recruited while being in the foster care system. In addition, three of the top ten highest trafficking areas in the nation are right here in California: San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego metropolitan areas. California's child welfare system is ill-equipped to respond to the needs of this population. In many respects, these victims are like other children that counties serve in the child welfare services system, but also have unique needs that cannot be fully met with current resources.

The commercial sexual exploitation of children is a critically important problem in California that requires a comprehensive solution. While some county child welfare agencies have made strides to serve this population, these counties have also taken years to build up their resources and collaborative processes. Meanwhile, this problem continues to grow and spread across the counties.

For this reason the undersigned agencies urge the Legislature to appropriate \$20.3 million General Funds in 2014-15 to build statewide capacity for serving child victims of commercial sexual exploitation. Resources are needed to provide services to commercially sexually exploited children in three major areas:

**Prevention:** Training for all child welfare staff, foster caregivers, and youth to recognize and report and respond when there are signs of commercial sexual exploitation.

*Intervention:* Resources are needed to enable county child welfare to leverage resources from other federal, state, and county agencies and to identify victims and track outcomes. In addition, specialized staff in the twelve large counties are needed to rescue and support victims, working alongside community-based partner organizations and with survivors, to provide services.

**Services:** CSEC need enhanced supervision and support to protect them which are not currently provided for in the foster care program, including immediate needs for clothing and safe shelter, and long-term services to re-engage CSEC into their schools and healthy relationships.

The initial cost of this proposal includes one-time costs for curriculum development and training of all foster caregivers, youth and child welfare staff. Beginning in 2015-16 the costs are estimated to be \$14.3 million GF to support the on-going services to CSEC.

We thank you for your attention to this important matter on behalf of child victims of commercial sexual exploitation.
