RE: SUPPORT - Los Angeles County Trailer Bill Language Proposal to Help Counties Combat Homelessness

The County Welfare Directors Association of California (CWDA) respectfully requests your support for trailer bill language (TBL) that would provide counties with the authority to seek voter approval to impose a special tax on personal annual incomes over \$1 million dollars for purposes of providing housing and services for homeless individuals and families.

California is enmeshed in a housing affordability crisis that affects millions of families, including a significant percentage of families served by county human services agencies across the range of programs counties administer on the state's behalf. Many of our families live below or close to the poverty line, a measure that doesn't take into account the state's high cost of living. Housing instability makes it more difficult for our staff to help families get off of the CalWORKs cash assistance program and get children in foster care reunified with their families.

According to the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA) alone, the overall number of homeless people in the County on any given night increased to 46,874 in 2016, which is 6% more than in 2015, and 19% more than in 2013. Los Angeles County also has provided data to the Legislature regarding the significant increase in homeless families receiving CalWORKs grants during and even after the recent recession, an issue other counties are experiencing as well.

This proposed measure would give counties additional flexibility to help in addressing the housing insecurity faced by so many Californians. As just an example, a one-half percent tax on personal income over \$1 million/year would be estimated to generate \$243 million annually in Los Angeles County.

In addition, Los Angeles County conducted a poll to determine voter support for potential revenue raising options. The most popular option tested was a tax on personal income above \$1 million/year, which was supported by 76% of likely Los Angeles County voters in the November 2016 General Election. Additionally, that same poll found that 64% of the voters polled would support the extension of Proposition 30, and that a measure to tax high income to combat homelessness would have no impact on the level of support for the extension of Proposition 30.

For all of these reasons, we support the Los Angeles County proposed trailer bill language and respectfully request your support for its inclusion in the final budget agreement.
