Abode Services has partnered with Alameda County to provide local shelters to help family's access housing and employment. In addition, we collaborated with the County of Santa Clara for the Rapid Rehousing Program for families. Through the program, participants have access to supportive services, housing services, and subsidy administration. The proposed funding augmentation of \$15 million State General Fund will provide much needed housing and services for families who are homeless and living in poverty in California.

The Housing Support Program was enacted as part of the 2014-15 state budget and assists homeless CalWORKs families by moving them directly out of homelessness and into permanent housing. In turn, stabilized housing supports families' efforts in reaching self-sufficiency. Currently funded at \$35 million, the HSP is expected to serve an estimated 9,000 children in 4,500 families in 2015-16. A \$15 million augmentation will enable the program to serve an additional estimated 3,800 children in 1,900 families throughout California.

Research shows that stable, safe housing is critical to the well-being, health, and long-term success of children and families. For children, homelessness contributes to impairments in cognitive development, physical health and self-regulation, and interferes with learning and social relationships; the younger the child, the more devastating the consequences. For homeless parents, 84 percent of whom are single mothers, lack of housing is both a consequence of and contributor to employment loss, depression, and physical health problems. The difficulties of job seeking as a homeless person can be an insurmountable barrier to employment.

The Counties of Alameda and Santa Clara, with whom we have partnered in this effort, received funding in the first year of the program, which has helped to meet a critical need. But we have more families in need than we are able to serve given the current level of funding. The following data illustrates the number of CalWORKS serviced in Alameda and Santa Clara Counties:

 In FY2015, Alameda CalWORKs served 29 adults and 36 children (65 total) in 24 households. 2 participants exited to permanent housing.

- So far in FY2016, Alameda CalWORKs has served 97 adults and 139 children (236 total) in 80 households. 54 participants have exited to permanent housing.
- In FY2015, Santa Clara CalWORKs served 117 adults and 148 children (265 total) in 81 households. 146
 participants exited to permanent housing.
- So far in FY2016, Santa Clara CalWORKs has served 162 adults and 245 children (407 total) in 117 households. 176 participants have exited to permanent housing.

For these reasons, Abode Services supports your efforts for additional funding to help families find permanent housing and support the goals of the CalWORKs program. Thank you for your advocacy on this important issue.

Alameda County Social Services Agency is writing to urge your support in fiscal year 2016-17 for enhanced funding for the CalWORKs Housing Support Program (HSP). The proposed funding augmentation of \$15 million State General Fund will provide much needed housing and services for families who are homeless and living in poverty in California. According to the most recent data available, California accounts for 21 percent of the country's homeless population.

The CalWORKs HSP was enacted as part of the 2014-15 state budget and assists homeless CalWORKs families by moving them directly out of homelessness and into permanent housing. In turn, stabilized housing supports families' efforts in reaching self-sufficiency. HSP is founded on the housing first principle of rapid re-housing, an evidence-based model that is proven to be cost-effective and have better outcomes than other housing models.

Currently funded at \$35 million, the HSP is expected to serve an estimated 9,000 children in 4,500 families in 2015-16. A \$15 million augmentation will enable the program to serve an additional estimated 3,800 children in 1,900 families throughout California.

Research shows that stable, safe housing is critical to the well-being, health, and long-term success of children and families. For children, homelessness contributes to impairments in cognitive development, physical health and self-regulation, and interferes with learning and social relationships; the younger the child, the more devastating the consequences. For homeless parents, 84 percent of whom are single mothers, lack of housing is both a consequence of and contributor to employment loss, depression, and physical health problems. The difficulties of job seeking as a homeless person can be an insurmountable barrier to employment.

Alameda County has received funding since the start the program, and it is helping to meet a critical need. Since 2014, CalWORKs HSP locally has enrolled over 260 clients and housed 109 families. However, the need for the program is much greater than the slots available given our current funding level. Increased funding would enable us to continue to address local needs for housing among our

most vulnerable residents. Additionally, homeless children in other counties who were not funded in the current round are in need.

For these reasons, Alameda County Social Services Agency supports additional funding to help families find permanent housing and support the goals of the CalWORKs program. Thank you for your support on this important issue.

As the housing partner in the Tuolumne County CalWORKS Housing Support Program, the Amador Tuolumne Community Action Agency (ATCAA) has been so inspired to witness the way the program is making it possible to <u>end</u> homelessness for families with children. To date, the program has provided secure housing and support services to 73 children and 51 adults in Tuolumne County, stabilizing over 100 households.

Ending family homelessness has been a goal for our agency and local partners for almost a decade. Along with 31 other agencies and service providers, ATCAA developed the Central Sierra Continuum of Care 9 years ago. Together, we produced a 10 Year Plan to End homelessness in the foothill counties of Amador, Calaveras, Tuolumne and Mariposa. *Ending family homelessness was the top priority in the Plan.*

We urge you to support enhanced funding for the Housing Support Program in fiscal year 2016-17. The proposed funding augmentation of \$15 million from the State General Fund will result in much needed housing and services for families who are homeless and living in poverty in California.

Our experience with homelessness shows that stable, safe housing makes all the difference to the well-being, health, and long-term success of children and families. For children, homelessness contributes to impairments in cognitive development and physical health. It also interferes with learning and social relationships. We know from the research that the younger the child, the more devastating the consequences. These are just words on a page, though, until you stand in our emergency shelter and watch a family pack up their scarce belongings and walk out the front door with nowhere to go.

The Housing Support Program has changed that. Every family with children that comes to our shelter now has a path to re-housing with this program. For homeless parents, 84% of whom are single mothers, living in safe and decent housing enables them to attend to physical and mental health problems for themselves and their children. With housing stabilized, they can hold a job or attend job training.

A '2013 Point-In-Time Homeless Census and Survey' from the Butte County Homeless Continuum of Care shows that out of over 1200 surveys completed, approximately 1,553 total individuals were experiencing homelessness in Butte County. Some notable results from the survey include:

- 17% of the homeless respondents reported having children
- 37% reported "employment/financial reasons" as the cause of homelessness
- 55% reported "no job or income" as a barrier to housing
- 31% reported living outdoors/unsheltered
- 63% reported having lived in Butte County for five years or longer
- 35% were "chronically homeless".
- 29% reported having some college level education.
- 32% reported having a physical disability.
- 23% reported having a mental illness.
- 3% reported being under Post-Release Community Supervision (AB 109)

Since November, 2015, Butte County has received over 300 Housing Support Program applications from families in need of safe and suitable housing and we continue to receive additional applications daily. The Housing Support Program funding has helped to meet a critical need, but we have more families in need than we are able to serve given the current level of funding. Additional Housing Support Program funding would enable us to continue to address local needs for housing and would also enable additional counties and their partner organizations that did not receive funding to provide services to other homeless children and families.

For these reasons, the Community Action Agency of Butte County supports your efforts for additional funding to help families find permanent housing and support the goals of the CalWORKs program. Thank you for your advocacy on this important issue.

- 102 households included children under age 18;
- 73 households included single adults with children (8% of total);

- 81 households were married or in partnership (7% of total);
- 41 households were married or in partnership, with children (4% of total);

The funding would enable us to continue to address local needs for housing and would also enable additional counties and their partner organizations that did not receive funding to provide services to other homeless children and families.

A '2013 Point-In-Time Homeless Census and Survey' from the Butte County Homeless Continuum of Care shows that out of over 1200 surveys completed, approximately 1,553 total individuals were experiencing homelessness in Butte County. Some notable results from the survey include:

- 17% of the homeless respondents reported having children
- 37% reported "employment/financial reasons" as the cause of homelessness
- 55% reported "no job or income" as a barrier to housing
- 31% reported living outdoors/unsheltered
- 63% reported having lived in Butte County for five years or longer
- 35% were "chronically homeless".
- 29% reported having some college level education.
- 32% reported having a physical disability.
- 23% reported having a mental illness.
- 3% reported being under Post-Release Community Supervision (AB 109)

Since November, 2015, Butte County has received over 300 Housing Support Program applications from families in need of safe and suitable housing and we continue to receive additional applications daily. The Housing Support Program funding has helped to meet a critical need, but we have more families in need than we are able to serve given the current level of funding. Additional Housing Support Program funding would enable us to continue to address local needs for housing and would also enable additional counties and their partner organizations that did not receive funding to provide services to other homeless children and families.

For these reasons, Butte County supports your efforts for additional funding to help families find permanent housing and support the goals of the CalWORKs program. Thank you for your advocacy on this important issue.

The Riverside county Office of the District Attorney respectfully requests your support to provide \$5 million State General Funds for statewide training of social work staff in the APS program. APS workers provide front-line response to seniors and dependent adults who are victims of abuse, neglect and exploitation. A trained and skilled workforce is essential to protecting this vulnerable population.

Elder and dependent adult abuse can take on many forms including financial abuse, and requires a well-trained social workers to conduct investigations on complex cases and help victims and their families navigate other systems to access services. The services provided by APS workers are often life-saving, enabling victims to remain safely in their own homes and community, preventing further harm and avoiding undesired, often costly outcomes such as placement into institutional settings such as nursing care. APS crosses multiple systems to protect and serve victims of abuse and neglect, working with law enforcement, legal aid programs, the judiciary, long-term care services and many others, and thus is a central component of the state's elder justice system.

It is critical that APS social workers are prepared as the demand for APS services grows. California's population of seniors is projected to double from 4.2 million in 2010 to 8.4 million by 2030. The oldest and potentially most vulnerable population of 85 and older will grow by 143 percent between 1990 and 2020 and this trend will continue through 2030.



The age breakdown for the PIT count was 6% for under the age of 18, 11% between the age of 18-24, and 83% for the age of 25 plus years. The PIT counted indicated that 57% were men, 43% were women, and less than 1% was transgender. The PIT count showed 73% or 795 Unsheltered, 41% were on the street, 3% were in abandoned buildings, 14% were in cars/vans/RV, and 15% were in

encampment areas. The CalWIN Homeless Case Count Report as of September 30, 2015 shows 524 unduplicated CalWORKs cases as homeless.

For children, homelessness contributes to impairments in cognitive development, physical health and self-regulation, and interferes with learning and social relationships; the younger the child, the more devastating the consequences. For homeless parents, 84 percent of whom are single mothers, lack of housing is both a consequence of and contributor to employment loss, depression, and physical health problems. The difficulties of job seeking as a homeless person can be an insurmountable barrier to employment.

Tehama County received funding in the second year of the program, and it is helping to meet a critical need. However, we have a greater need than we are able to meet given our current funding level. Using data received from fiscal reporting (July 2014 through June 2015), Tehama County averaged 1,266 active CalWORKs cases each month. We received an average of six requests per month for homeless

assistance during this same period. Throughout the 12-month period we evaluated, we had an average of 115 CalWORKs families identify as homeless each month representing an average of 9.1% of all CalWORKs families in Tehama County for the year. The increased funding would enable us to continue to address local needs for housing among our most vulnerable residents. Additionally, homeless children in other counties who were not funded in the current round are in need.

For these reasons, Tehama County supports your efforts for additional funding to help families find permanent housing and support the goals of the CalWORKs program. Thank you for your advocacy on this important issue.

The proposed funding augmentation of \$15 million State General Fund will provide much needed housing and services for families who are homeless and living in poverty in California.

Yuba County received funding in the initial year of the program, and it is helping to meet a critical need. However, we have a greater need than we are able to meet given our current funding level. In January 2015, the Sutter-Yuba Homeless Consortium completed a Point in Time study of the current homeless count in the Yuba and Sutter County area. The study estimated there are 869 people homeless in the bicounty area, which is a 19.7% increase since 2014. Of the 869 individuals, 261 were children ages 17 and under. At the time of this study, 52.6% (or 461) of the 869 homeless persons declared they had stayed in Yuba County the previous night. The increased funding would enable us to continue to address local needs for housing among our most vulnerable residents. Additionally, homeless children in other counties who were not funded in the current round are in need.
