




THE NEED

Many foster/probation youth leave the foster care system at age 18, without a job, behind educationally and with no resources.


- Each year 25,000 youth "age out" of the foster care system in the U.S., including 4,500 in California.
- 18-22% of youth who age out of foster care experience homelessness within the three years.

John Burton Foundation for Children Without Homes & California Coalition for Youth



- Up to 50% of former foster/probation youth become homeless within the first 18 months of emancipation.
- Less than half of former foster youth are employed 2.5 4 years after leaving foster care.
- Youth in foster care are 44% less likely to graduate from high school & after emancipation 40-50 & never complete high school.




THE NEED

- Foster youth in Tuolumne County often end up homeless or moving from home to to home after emancipation.
- Tuolumne County has a shortage of housing in general, but especially housing that will accept young adults without cosigners.
- Transportation remains limited and cumbersome.
- In December 2005, when plans were initiated, there were 46 youth eligible for the program.

Mission Statement

To provide emancipated foster and probation youth a transitional housing opportunity with real-life concrete opportunities, supported with individualized, strengthbased services that will enable them to obtain skills and abilities necessary for a successful transition to adulthood. Tuolumne County is committed to assisting emancipated youth with accessing housing & services designed to fulfill the goals included in each youth's Transitional Independent Living Plan.

- Tuolumne County unique in approach of building facility just for the CWS and Probation youth emancipating out of foster care.





IMPLEMENTATION

The Project: Renovate an existing county-owned building, expanding it to a 3633 sq. foot residence with 6 bedrooms, 2 bathrooms, an office and a study. The building would be retrofitted to meet ADA requirements, and the County would contribute parking, fencing and landscaping.




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• In November 2005, EHAP issued a Notice of Funding Availability for \$31 million in new projects, of which \$6.2 million was set aside for projects in rural areas.



U.S. Dept. of Housing & Urban Development (HUD)

- · Competitive-Continuum of Care (COC)
- McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act programs require the development of a COC in the community
 - Address Homeless through coordinated community-based process of identifying needs & building system to address the needs
 - Homelessness is not caused merely by lack of shelter

CONTINUUM OF CARE

- Supportive Housing Program-Provides housing, including housing units & group quarters, that has a supportive environment & includes a planned service component.
- Shelter Plus Care Program— Grants for rental assistance for homeless persons w/disabilities through four component programs (tenant, sponsor, project & Single Room Occupancy Rental Assistance)
- Single Room Occupancy Program. Rental assistance on behalf of homeless individuals in connection w/moderate rehabilitation of SRO dwellings



SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROGRAM

Designed to develop supportive housing & services that will allow homeless persons to live as independently as possible

Three goals: achieve residential stability, increase skill level and/or income, obtain greater self-determination.

Population Served

- THP-Plus tenants are young adults who have emancipated from foster/probation_care and are at least 18 years of age, but not yet 24 years of age;
- Are pursuing the county-approved goals they have developed in the Transitional Independent Living Plan (TILP);
- Are actively participating in school if a diploma or GED has not yet been obtained, or are participating in vocational training;
- Are obtaining & maintaining part-time or full-time employment as appropriate;
- Are maintaining a substance-free lifestyle.



Referral & Screening Process

- The placement social worker, probation officer or the Independent Living Plan (ILP) Coordinator may initiate a referral.
- The referring party should schedule an assessment with the youth.
- The referring party should assist the youth in completing the application process.
- The Social Svs. Supervisor shall follow-up with a review of the application and references, the completion of at least one interview with the youth, consultation with the social worker/probation officer or ILP Coordinator, and either accept or reject the application.

- · Case management/life coach
- 24-br crisis intervention and support.
- A mentor & support team.
- Referrals for mental health & substance abuse screening

- · Educational advocacy
- Assistance finding affordable bousing
- Participation in ILP & execution of the TILP


