
This is really challenging work – even on the hard days, what is it that keeps you in this field of work? What really matters to you?

What are the two things that are working well for emancipated foster youth in your county?


If you could have it your way and change things for young people emancipating out of care, what would you dream for?



We have designed and implemented five best practices to guide our work with current and former foster youth. Time over time we have evaluated the effectiveness of this model and have found that each element is crucial to the success of individual youth, our program and the community at large.



V.O.I.C.E.S. Sonoma Model for Systems Change



The diagram above, the "V.O.I.C.E.S. Sonoma Model for Systems Change," portrays the inter-generational and inter-agency collaboration taking place within Sonoma County. Dashed lines indicate teams that exist. Smaller circles represent individuals and agencies, while the larger green circles represent collaborating systems. All teams will participate in various times in shared decision making about how the Center operates and what services it will provide.

Current and former foster youth form the core of this program. All youth utilizing V.O.I.C.E.S. are required to enroll as members. All members are expected to contribute back to the wellbeing of the overall V.O.I.C.E.S. community.

Teams exist among current and former foster youth, co-located and internal frontline staff and agency directors. Intergenerational leadership takes place as members of each of these teams come together to provide direction, serve on committees, make presentations, develop policies and procedures and shape the ongoing vision of the program.

8) YOUTH-INITIATED, SHARED DECISIONS WITH ADULTS

This happens when projects or programs are initiated by youth and decision-making is shared between youth and adults. These projects empower youth while at the same time enabling them to access and learn from the life experience and expertise of adults.

6) ADULT-INITIATED, SHARED DECISIONS WITH YOUTH

Occurs when projects or programs are initiated by adults but the decision-making is shared with the youth.

4) ASSIGNED BUT INFORMED

This is where youth are assigned a specific role and informed about how and why they are being involved.

2) DECORATION

Happens when youth are used to help or "bolster" a cause in a relatively indirect way, although adults do not pretend that the cause is inspired by youth.

7) YOUTH-INITIATED & DIRECTED

This step is when youth initiate and direct a project or program. Adults are involved only in a supportive role.

5) CONSULTED & INFORMED

Happens when youth give advice on projects or programs designed and run by adults. The youth are informed about how their input will be used and the outcomes of the decisions made by adults.

3) TOKENISM

When youth appear to be given a voice, but in fact have little or no choice about what they do or how they participate.

1) MANIPULATION

Happens where adults use youth to support causes and pretend that the causes are inspired by youth.
